Vv. I-3

- I. How are the first verses of ch. 5 similar to the ending verses of ch. I (see particularly 1:26-27)? Why do you suppose this is so and what might be the purpose behind it?
- 2. V. 3 makes a point of telling us that Seth is different than his dad. What's the big difference?

Vv. 4-32

General Ouestions:

- 3. What is the basic genealogical outline in this section (what is the "order" of each paragraph)? Which originals get different treatment?
- 4. How are people living so long? Is there any meaning behind their long life?
- 5. Who lives the longest and are there any ages that stand out?

BONUS: How is chapter 5 both a chapter of hope and also a reminder of humanities grim reality after the fall?

Enoch (vv. 21-24):

6. What was unique about Enoch? And what does Hebrews 11:5-6 say made him unique?

Lamech to Noah (vv. 28-32):

- 7. Noah means "comfort" and that is what Lamech named him. How will he comfort people:
 - a. Just being born in the midst of terrible soil conditions?
 - b. Stay alive during the flood?
 - c. Making it through the flood onto a much more productive soil?
 - d. Discovering how to make wine (9:20)?

Wickedness and God's Responses (6:1-8)

Vv. I-4

- 8. Who are the "sons of God"?
 - a. Divine beings a little less than God
 - b. Angels
