Vv. 6-16

- 8. Who all enters the ark? And who shuts them in?
- 9. What do vv. II-I2 tell us about how the flood happened?

Vv. 17-24

10. How long and how much water came upon the earth?

BONUS: Verse 20 could actually mean that the waters just rose fifteen cubits altogether (literally: "The waters rose more than fifteen cubits, and the mountains/high hills were covered."). Do you think this was a worldwide flood or a local one, or maybe something altogether different?

Vv. 6-14

- 13. What two birds does Noah send out of the ark? What does the second bird finally bring back in it's beak as a sign of dry ground and what is the meaning of it?
- 14. How long was Noah in the ark?



Vv. 15-22

- 15. What is God's command to Noah and every living creature in vv. 15-19 and how is it a type of "re-creation"?
- 16. What does Noah do immediately once he debarks? Why do you think he did this instead of pitching a tent or building a house or planting a garden?
- 17. What is God's promise upon smelling Noah's offering in vv. 21-22?

Concluding Question:

Does something change about humanity in the flood or does something change about God in the flood?
